**Millbury crash leaves
Braintree man dead, Rhode
Island man with serious**

injuries

Yesterday morning, at approximately 9:20 a.m., troopers from the State Police Millbury and Charlton Barracks responded to reports of a serious crash on the ramp from I-90 Eastbound to the Route 20 Connector in Millbury.

Upon arrival, troopers discovered that a 2003 Toyota Land Cruiser, operated by Richard Nichols, 66, of Braintree, had crossed over the median, and struck a 2019 Isuzu Box Truck head-on. The Isuzu was operated by a 53-year-old man from North Providence, Rhode Island. The Rhode Island man was transported to UMass Memorial in Worcester by medical helicopter with life threatening injuries. Nichols, the driver of the Toyota, was determined to be deceased on scene.

The ramp system at Exit 10A from the Massachusetts Turnpike, I-90, was closed for the duration of the crash and crash reconstruction. The ramp system was opened when the scene cleared at approximately 1:30 p.m.

The remaining facts and circumstances remain under investigation by troopers assigned to the State Police Charlton Barracks, Troop C Headquarters, State Police Detective Unit assigned to Worcester County District Attorney's Office, State Police Crime Scene Services Section (CSSS), State Police Collision Analysis Reconstruction Section (CARS), Massachusetts Office of the Chief Medical Examiner, and the Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MA DOT) all assisted on scene.

Massachusetts Environmental Police seize catch at Fairhaven dock

"On Wednesday, May 13, 2020, Fairhaven Police Department notified Massachusetts Environmental Police Officers that a possible 'for hire' trip had left a marina in Fairhaven with clients from Connecticut aboard.

Environmental Police Officers observed the vessel return to a dock in Fairhaven at approximately 12:00 p.m. A subsequent inspection of the vessel and catch found that the Captain did not possess a valid Massachusetts DMF Charter Permit and the permit he did offer was for a different vessel.

The Captain faces numerous fishing violations and will appear in court at a later date. The 250-pound catch of scup was seized and donated to the New Bedford Salvation Army."-

New Partnership Between Nonprofit Accelerator EforAll and Peer-to-Peer Group Program Eforever Will Allow Small Business Owners to Help Each Other Persevere and Thrive.

Recognizing the importance of peer-to-peer support to small business owners facing unprecedented challenges as a result of the COVID-19 crisis, the nonprofit Entrepreneurship for All (EforAll) announced today that it is partnering with the Mansmann Foundation to provide existing businesses and

nonprofits in the South Coast with access to the community-based group program known as “eforever.”

As businesses nationwide look for ways to innovate and continue operating throughout the crisis, EforAll and eforever will deliver programs to support local business owners in the South Coast area. Monthly meetings will provide opportunities for small business owners and entrepreneurs to meet virtually or in-person to share their business experiences and learn from one another under the guidance of a trained facilitator.

“Our mission is to accelerate economic and social impact in the communities we serve through inclusive entrepreneurship,” said EforAll CEO David Parker. “Joining forces with Mansmann’s eforever program in the South Coast is a natural extension of our mission and allows us to provide peer-to-peer support for local businesses – something that’s particularly critical during these challenging times but invaluable on an ongoing basis for EforAll alumni and other small business owners.”

EforAll’s proven approach helps under-resourced individuals successfully start and grow their businesses or nonprofits through a unique combination of immersive business training, dedicated mentorship and access to a professional network. EforAll has offered its no-cost Business Accelerator twice a year in the South Coast since 2015, along with quarterly Pitch Contests where entrepreneurs can test a business idea in front of their community. The nonprofit has helped more than 500 businesses get started across the communities it serves.

Since 2014, the eforever program has helped 326 entrepreneurs make better business decisions, persevere through challenges and feel more confident in sustaining and growing their businesses in 15 different communities in the Pittsburgh, PA area. The program utilizes professionally facilitated groups that typically consist of 8-10 small and diverse business owners who meet monthly for a roundtable review of member progress, peer-to-peer problem solving to help overcome member

challenges and interactive skill-building activities. Members agree to strict confidentiality and operate non-competing businesses.

“We’ve seen first-hand how inspiring and effective these peer-to-peer groups can be in the Pittsburgh area, and we’re excited about partnering with EforAll to expand into communities like the South Coast,” said AJ Drexler, CEO of the Mansmann Foundation. “97% of the businesses in this lifelong group are still operational and 74% feel more confident about their finances as a result of their eforever experience.”

EforAll and eforever plan to launch the first peer-to-peer group in the South Coast in early summer 2020 with 8-10 local business owners who work full-time on their venture, have been operating at least one year and meet a minimum annual revenue threshold. The program will be offered at no cost and all interested businesses and nonprofits are encouraged to learn more or apply at entrepreneursforever.org/MA. Eforever will be hiring someone in the South Coast area to oversee its new program within the next few months.

- There are many items NOT accepted at household hazardous waste day that you may be able to take to your Transfer Station such as motor oil, antifreeze, fluorescent light bulbs, TVs, and propane tanks. Massachusetts State Police respond to multi-vehicle crash in Stoneham; vehicle in water

At approximately 2:40 p.m. today Troopers assigned to the Medford Barracks responded to reports of a multi vehicle crash on Route 93 Southbound prior to Exit 33 in Stoneham. Upon

their arrival they discovered a 2017 Mercedes Convertible that veered off the road, then struck a guardrail and crashed into a body of water. Several witnesses on scene described to Troopers a black SUV that set the crash into motion, then fled the scene disregarding signals to pull over from other drivers.

A 2003 Toyota Corolla was also involved in the crash; that operator was uninjured and the vehicle was able to be driven. The operator of the Mercedes, a 59-year-old female from Charlestown, was transported to an area hospital with non-life-threatening injuries.

Witnesses of the crash were able to provide a license plate for the black SUV and the incident, including the identity of the SUV operator and the cause of the crash, remains under investigation by Troopers assigned to State Police-Medford. Troopers were assisted on scene by Stoneham Fire.



Impaired driver strikes Massachusetts State Police cruiser; charged with OUI-4th offense

Shortly before midnight last night an impaired driver struck a Massachusetts State Police cruiser from behind while the Trooper was conducting a traffic stop on Summer Street in Fitchburg.

Neither the Trooper, who was outside the cruiser, nor the driver who struck the cruiser, CRAIG JATRINSKI, 48, of Fitchburg, were injured in the crash.



The Trooper, along with other Troopers who responded to the scene, made observations of JATRINSKI's appearance and slurred speech, and detected an odor of alcohol coming from him. Troopers administered field sobriety tests and a portable breathalyzer test.

As a result of their observations and the field tests, Troopers placed JATRINSKI under arrest and transported hi to the State Police-Leominster Barracks, where Troopers determined he had been charged with three prior OUI offenses that resulted in either convictions or continuances without findings, warranting his being charged in the current incident with Operating Under the Influence of Liquor-4th Offense. Troopers also determined that JATRINSKI's driver's license was currently suspended as a result of one of the prior OUI charges. He was additionally charged with the following offenses:

- Operating Under the Influence While Suspended for OUI;
- Negligent Operation of a Motor Vehicle;
- Driving an Unregistered Motor Vehicle; and
- Failure to Move Over for an Emergency Vehicle.

While at the Barracks, JATRINSKI refused to submit to a breath-alcohol test, resulting in an automatic license suspension (As noted above, JATRINSKI's license status was already suspended).

Investigation indicates that the Trooper who was struck, and who was operating a fully marked cruiser, had stopped a motor vehicle in the area of 245 Summer St. in Fitchburg. The cruiser's emergency blue lights were activated. During the stop, the Trooper was standing next to the vehicle he had stopped when a 2007 white Honda Accord sedan struck the rear of the cruiser, a Ford Interceptor utility vehicle. JATRINSKI exited the Accord and the Trooper checked him for injuries and determined he was not injured.

At the Barracks, a bail clerk set bail at \$5,000 plus the standard \$40 bail fee, and JATRINKSI was held pending arraignment through Fitchburg District Court.
