
Family, friends watch Greater New Bedford Voc-Tech Class of '24 Artisans graduate!

New Bedford neighbors, city officials celebrate the \$1.7 million reimagining of Ashley Park

"NEW BEDFORD — Mayor Jon Mitchell and other City officials joined Goulart Square neighbors Monday morning to celebrate the renovation of Ashley Park. The ribbon-cutting ceremony capped the year-long \$1.7 million project to reimagine the key public space in the heart of one of the City's most historic

and diverse neighborhoods.

From a new entrance area at the corner of Rivet and Orchard streets to new pathways and enhanced green space, the renovation project is the latest example of the Mitchell administration's focus on providing safe, well-maintained, and aesthetically pleasing parks, playgrounds, and recreational facilities.

The City secured \$1.7 million in Community Development Block Grant funding through the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development to finance the project.

"The reimagined Ashley Park exemplifies our commitment to high design standards for public spaces in every neighborhood," Mayor Jon Mitchell said. "I want to thank our federal delegation for supporting the CDBG program, which helped fund the project."

Park upgrades include reworked pathways around and within the park, a new prominent entrance at the corner of Rivet and Orchard streets, and new lighting, benches, and landscaping

throughout. The underutilized softball field along Orchard Street was replaced with new green space for passive and active recreation.

The completed park will be managed by the City's Department of Parks, Recreation and Beaches, and maintained by the Department of Public Infrastructure.

The City's Office of Housing & Community Development partnered with the Department of Parks, Recreation and Beaches to plan the renovation. Crowley Cottrell, a renowned landscape architecture firm, engaged with neighborhood stakeholders in designing the new park, and local contractor P.A. Landers did the construction work over the last year.

The improved Ashley Park is one of many significant developments in the Goulart Square neighborhood recently. A new elementary school will be built in the coming years to replace the Congdon and DeValles schools, and NorthStar Learning has already broken ground on a new early education center. Additionally, the playground at Ashley Park at the corner of Swift and Orchard streets will be completely remodeled from the ground up over the next year.

Massachusetts Peregrine Falcon cam allows you to watch just hatched chicks grow up

"Can you believe these fluffy little chicks will grow up to be the fastest bird on Earth and fierce predators?


Yesterday, our biologists banded three recently hatched peregrine falcon chicks from a nesting box on MassDOT's Gillis Bridge.

During the banding, biologists assessed the health of the falcon chicks and placed identifying bands on their legs. These bands provide useful information about the birds'

movements, lifespan, and injury recovery.

MassWildlife and MassDOT partner to provide nest boxes to protect both wildlife and infrastructure. Peregrine falcons are excellent at hunting pigeons, who are known for leaving acidic and corrosive droppings that wear away at our bridges and increase needed maintenance. When nesting peregrine falcons are near, the pigeons stay away and the bridges have a longer lifespan — a win for everyone!





New Bedford Fire Dept. HazMat Techs drill for cold storage ammonia leaks to prevent fatalities

"The City of New Bedford is home to a large number of cold storage facilities, utilizing anhydrous ammonia as a refrigerant, along its working waterfront and in other areas of the City.

Anhydrous ammonia leaks occur several times a year in these

large refrigeration systems. A fatality from an ammonia leak in Needham, MA that occurred in late 2022, shows the need for the ability to make rapid rescues at these incidents.

Today, New Bedford Fire Department Hazardous Materials Technicians received training in the equipment and techniques necessary to conduct rescues in an ammonia rich environment. The training was paid for with an HMEP (Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness) Grant and conducted by The Hazmat Guys. The training suits were loaned to us for use by the FDNY.

We would like to thank our Hazmat Coordinator FF Travis Rebello and EMA Director Brian Nobrega for applying for and successfully obtaining the grant funding and Safeware Inc. for their assistance in setting up the training class."-New Bedford Fire Department.

"MARION — Chief Richard Nighelli and Superintendent Michael S. Nelson are pleased to welcome a new comfort dog to the Marion Police Department and Sippican Elementary School.

Norman is a 13-week-old Labrador Retriever. He officially joined the department on Friday, June 7.

Sippican Elementary School students voted between a total of three names, with Norman receiving the most votes. Murray came in second and Franklin came in third.

"I am extremely grateful to District Attorney Timothy Cruz who helped identify grant funding that made this programming a possibility for the Marion community," said Superintendent Nelson. "I'm also very appreciative of Chief Nighelli and SRO Tracy for their leadership and commitment on this initiative as well. Additionally, I'd like to thank Geoff Gorman, Marion's Town Administrator who has been supportive each step of the way as we worked towards bringing a comfort dog to our school community. Sippican Elementary School is very fortunate to have such strong partnerships supporting education. To be blunt, the faculty, staff members, and students are absolutely ecstatic and I am too!"

Norman will spend most of his time on shift in the school district with School Resource Officer Jonathan Tracy. He will help with de-escalation, and provide comfort to children and staff in need who may be experiencing or have experienced trauma.

Once old enough, Norman and Officer Tracy will attend an 80-hour 10-day training course which will consist of lessons in obedience, socialization, environmental training, auditory training, proprioceptive (motion) and unexpected stimulus training. The training will take place at Professional Canine Services in Middleborough.

At the conclusion of the program, dogs should be confident, socialized and environmentally sound. All dogs must pass the American Kennel Club C.G.C. (Canine Good Citizen) and the

A.K.C Temperament Test.

A comfort dog is intended to help connect police with community members to spark conversation and build awareness. People who may be unsure of or uncomfortable with police may be more apt to approach a friendly comfort dog which will open up opportunities to make connections.

Norman will also assist with difficult police calls, especially those involving children. He will also make routine visits to senior centers, nursing homes and community events.

"We know that research has shown that there are many benefits of having comfort dogs in elementary schools with children, like helping teach empathy, helping with developing stronger social skills, as well as helping build stronger bonds between students and the

"We are very excited about this initiative," said Chief Richard Nighelli. "There were several moving parts to this and so many people to thank including our town officials, Superintendent Nelson, Sippican School faculty and students, DA Cruz, Marion Animal Hospital, and of course Officer Tracy. "NEW BEDFORD — The Community Preservation Committee is hosting a public hearing on Tuesday, June 11, at 6 p.m. to gather input from the public that will help update the Community Preservation Plan for the new fiscal year. The hearing will take place at the New Bedford Free Public Library, 613 Pleasant St., in the 3rd floor meeting room.

The Community Preservation Plan identifies and establishes the City's priorities in each of the CPA categories — Open Space/Recreation, Historic Resources, and Community Housing — through an open and transparent process involving public input. The annual plan guides the allocation of funds by the CPC to projects that improve and benefit the community.

The draft Community Plan will be available for review beginning June 11 at http://www.newbedford-ma.gov/planning/community-preservation/. Written comments will be accepted through Friday, July 5, via email to CPA@newbedford-ma.gov or by mail to CPC — Department of City Planning, 133 William St., Room 303, New Bedford, MA 02740.

Upon completion of the new fiscal year Community Preservation Plan update and approval by the Community Preservation Committee, the FY25 application cycle will begin with the Application Technical Workshop scheduled for Thursday, Sept. 5. The CPC highly recommends all interested in applying for CPA funding attend the September workshop.

About the Community Preservation Act

New Bedford voters adopted the Community Preservation Act through a ballot question in November 2014. The statewide enabling legislation allows communities to create dedicated funding for projects that support open space, outdoor recreational facilities, historic preservation, and affordable housing activities in the city.

Oversight of this process rests with the Community Preservation Committee, the body established by the City to oversee the CPA program in New Bedford.

CPA funding is derived through two sources: a 1.5% surcharge on local property taxes and a state match on local revenue. For the FY24 application cycle, the CPC recommended, and City Council approved, \$2.2 million in CPA funds to 21 projects.

Since FY18, the committee has recommended, and the City Council has approved, 122 grants totaling more than \$12.5 million in CPA funding for projects that have preserved historic resources and open space, created community housing

opportunities, and both improved and created recreational facilities throughout the city. In addition, these grants have enabled organizations to leverage an additional \$12.3 million in funding from other sources, such as state and federal funds, and private foundations."-City of New Bedford.
