New Bedford man whose negligent driving resulted in death of Assonet woman convicted

"A 51-year-old New Bedford man was convicted by a jury of his peers late this afternoon in New Bedford District Court of Motor Vehicle Homicide by Negligent Operation in connection to the 2022 death of an Assonet woman, Bristol County District Attorney Thomas M. Quinn III announced.

The jury deliberated for less than an hour before returning its guilty verdict around 4 pm today. The trial began yesterday afternoon.

At around 2:30 am on August 20, 2022, state and local police were called to an area of Route 140 North in New Bedford after receiving a 911 call about a motor vehicle vs. pedestrian incident.

Evidence at trial showed that Christopher Noguera was driving northbound on Route 140 in his Ford F-150 when he crossed over into the breakdown lane and slammed into Joy Swartzendruber, who was standing next to her Toyota Avalon. Dash-cam video seized from the defendant's vehicle showed that the victim was clearly standing off the roadway when the defendant's truck first impacted the rear driver's side of her vehicle and then into her and other portions of her vehicle. Her vehicle had all its lights on and was visible to other motorists on the highway. The victim was pronounced deceased at the scene.

The video also showed the defendant driving negligently during the minutes before the crash. His vehicle could be seen frequently drifting from lane to lane and into the breakdown lane in the moments before the crash. The defendant remained on scene after the crash and was not impaired or excessively speeding. However, the jury found he clearly was operating his motor vehicle in a negligent manner, which directly led to the fatal incident.

The maximum sentence allowable for the charge is two-and-a-half years in the house of corrections.

Assistant District Attorney Patrick Driscoll, who prosecuted the case, argued that the defendant should be sentenced to two-and-a-half years in the house of corrections with two years to serve and the balance of the sentence suspended for three years. The defense requested minimal jail time.

Judge Kristen Stone, however, sentenced the defendant to two years in the house of corrections, with one year to serve and the balance of the sentence was suspended for three years. This "split sentence" means if the defendant is charged with a new crime during the three years after his eventual release from jail, he could be liable to serve the remaining year of the jail term. The defendant also had his driver's license revoked for 15 years.

"The defendant's negligent operation of his pickup truck resulted in a terrible tragedy that could easily have been avoided. The victim was clearly in the breakdown lane when the defendant struck and killed her. My heart goes out the family for their terrible loss. I hope today's verdict, and the sentence imposed by the court, provides some consolation to them," District Attorney Quinn said."

The fascinating, controversial story behind the hidden New Bedford tombstone of Daddy Grace

New Bedford, Massachusetts stands a rather impressive mausoleum, statue, and plaque. This stands in remembrance of Marcelino Manuel da Graça, otherwise known as Charles Manuel "Sweet Daddy" Grace.

Daddy Grace was born on January 25th in the Cape Verde Islands. Interestingly, there is no verifiable information to confirm his exact birth year, although most sources either state 1881 or 1884.

In May of 1902 his family set sail aboard a ship named "The Freeman" and he arrived in America at the port of New Bedford, Massachusetts. 17 years later in 1919 he quit his job as a railway cook and built the first "House of Prayer" in West Wareham, Massachusetts at the cost of \$39.

In December of 1921, a regular meeting place in New Bedford was organized on 357 Kempton Street. Throughout the 1920's and 30's Daddy Grace traveled extensively across the country holding tent meetings, healing services, and mass baptisms which were attended by the thousands.

Many people became members of the House of Prayer after these spiritual services because of the "healing power of Christ" being demonstrated. He was able to build an organization of 350 "Houses of Prayer" with a national membership of over 3 million followers.

His ability to step off the boat onto the Port of New Bedford with absolutely nothing in his name, and become an extremely wealthy man building over 350 churches with over 3 million followers is absolutely remarkable.

But unfortunately there is an aspect to his story which many have a major issue with.



Many would flat out tell you that "Sweet Daddy Grace" really was a cult leader who would enrich himself from his followers of the "Houses of Prayer". It is rumored that he built a large wealthy empire by selling things like "plots in heaven" and "drinks that would cure anything" to his followers.

He made so much money that he actually bought the largest apartment building in New York City.

According to reporting from Southcoast Today, he faced some legal battles regarding tax evasion, IRS investigations, and even human trafficking which all make sense in regards to how he built his wealth. Although I don't believe it is necessary to dig into the details of his legal issues, I figured it is important to note as it gives credibility to the rumors and stories surrounding him.

The story of Marcelino Manuel da Graça is a fascinating one to say the least. A poor kid that sailed to New Bedford from Cape Verde and became a wildly rich and famous cult leader that bought the tallest apartment in New York City. His life story has "Netflix Documentary" written all over it.

Bishop Charles (Daddy) M. Grace, wealthy religious cult leader and landowner, bought the tallest apartment building in New York for an estimated \$4,-000,000. Named the Eldorado. the 34-story, 216 - apartment building occupies an entire block front on swank Central Park West, home of scores of millionaires. Cash

payment for the building was not disclosed, but Joseph H. Lopin, Grace's real estate manager, said mortgages total \$3,800,000. Bishop Grace, who heads the House of Prayer for All People, also owns large apartment buildings on New York's Sugar Hill and Riverside Drive, has real estate holdings in Los Angeles and Cuba.

Boston doctor indicted for exposing himself to minor sitting next to him on flight

"A Boston man was indicted today by a federal grand jury in Boston for allegedly masturbating and exposing himself within the view of a 14-year-old female seated next to him onboard a flight from Honolulu to Boston in May 2022.

Dr. Sudipta Mohanty, 33, was indicted on one count of lewd, indecent and obscene acts while in the special aircraft jurisdiction of the United States. Mohanty was arrested and charged by criminal complaint on Aug. 10, 2023 and was released on conditions.

According to the charging documents, at the time of his arrest Mohanty was an internal medicine and primary care doctor with a practice in Boston. It is alleged that, on May 27, 2022, Mohanty was a passenger aboard a Hawaiian Airlines Flight enroute from Honolulu to Boston with a female companion. Mohanty was allegedly seated next to a 14-year-old minor travelling with her grandparents, who were seated nearby.

About half-way through the flight, the minor allegedly observed that Mohanty had covered himself with a blanket up to his neck and that Mohanty's leg was bouncing up and down. Shortly thereafter, the minor observed that the blanket was on the floor, no longer covering Mohanty, and that Mohanty was masturbating. The minor moved herself to an empty seat in a different row for the remainder of the flight.

After arriving in Boston, the minor informed members of her family about the incident and law enforcement was notified.

The charge of lewd, indecent and obscene acts while in the special aircraft jurisdiction of the United States provides for a sentence of up to 90 days in prison, up to one year of supervised release and a fine of up to \$5,000. Sentences are imposed by a federal district court judge based upon the U.S. Sentencing Guidelines and statutes which govern the determination of a sentence in a criminal case.

Acting United States Attorney Joshua S. Levy and Jodi Cohen, Special Agent in Charge of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Boston Division made the announcement today. Assistant U.S. Attorney Elianna J. Nuzum of the Major Crimes Unit is prosecuting the case.

The details contained in the charging documents are allegations. The defendant is presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt in a court of law."-Massachusetts Department of Justice.

NOAA projecting New Bedford could get whalloped by tropical storm this weekend

Massachusetts State Police sobriety checkpoint nets multiple OUI arrests

"Interdiction of impaired drivers has always been a core mission of the Massachusetts State Police, one that Troopers fulfill in various ways — through regular patrols out of 37 MSP Barracks across the state, dedicated patrols targeting specific trouble spots as identified by statistical analysis, and sobriety checkpoints set up on busy roads in areas of high incidence of drunk driving crashes and arrests.

One such checkpoint was in operation on the night of Thursday, Sept. 7 into the early morning of Friday, Sept. 8 on Route 18 in New Bedford.

At checkpoints, Troopers greet every vehicle that comes through the checkpoint, and if the initial interaction gives the Trooper reason to suspect further investigation is warrant, the driver is waived over to a safe area off the side for further conversation with Troopers. After that, if a Trooper suspects the driver may be under the influence of alcohol or drugs, standardized field sobriety tests will be administered. Based on observations, conversation with the driver, and the result of the field sobriety tests, the Trooper will determine if the motorist will be arrested for operating under the influence. Checkpoints are coordinated and overseen by the MSP's Traffic Programs Section.
